Dear Friends in Mission ...

The Preamble of the Constitution reads, "We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America."

As the U.S. celebrates her 244th birthday, it makes one thankful about the blessings of liberty to worship with no real persecution. And although summertime brings a sluggish ministry schedule, especially with COVID-19 IFC social disruption, we are working harder to make IFC zoom classes possible. With so many unknowns in the near future, we trust that God is giving us quality time to having straight talk and Bible study with Muslims.

One particular family has a special situation. Originally Palestinian, this family was born and raised Muslim, until one day the mother, let's call her Andrea, was fed-up with the mistreatment of women in that specific region she lived in.

The culture, dominated by Islam, favors men over women. Andrea's strong personality helped her pave her way to become a lawyer, and she ran for office during the general elections. Of course, the radical Islamic groups defied her ambitions and helped her fail by voting in record numbers against her. Her disappointment was profound. One day, the Imam was performing the 'Athan', the Muslim call-to-prayer through the mosque's speakers, as this is the norm in predominantly Muslim cities. Her soul refused to hear this call to prayer while, on the other hand, experiencing extreme suppression of basic rights because she is a woman. It was the last push to make her reconsider Islam as a faith and a way of life.

Andrea always noticed how the minority, Palestinian Christians, were different; respectful in their way of treatment; gentler in responses, and do not display discrimination against Christian or Muslim women.

So she asked an older Christian friend of hers about Jesus. The lady friend expounded and referred Andrea to local pastors to betterequip her with Christian resources about Christianity and Christ's teachings. In Islam, Jesus Christ is revered but only a prophet, and was not crucified. Muhammad is the ultimate role model.


As she grew fond of Christians, she was wondering whether Christ is Who He claimed He was. according to the Gospel. She read Jesus' commandments, and she was blissfullv surprised bv His teachings. In the Muslim world, the religious leaders installed in their followers' minds to avoid touching the Bible, accusing it of being distorted and having powers that alter one's thinking about Islam. Only the Quran is acceptable by Muslims.

After her husband immigrated to the U.S., the Lord Jesus showed up in Andrea's dreams, several times! He did not identify Himself by name, but every time she saw this gleaming Man in the dream, He hugs her, comforts her, and holds her neck and calls her 'sister.' Andrea was tearful recounting her testimony, realizing how personal and friendly God can be.

"Both the one who makes people holy and those who are made holy are of the same family. So Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters." (Hebrews 2:11)

Astonishingly, her mother-in-law (MIL) saw the same dream Andrea had.

The MIL, of course, did not recognize the Man as Jesus. She told Andrea that she tried to fight this Man off but He would tell the MIL, "No, she is mine," referring to Andrea. Indeed!

The bottom line: Andrea believed, was baptized, and now she is living with her husband and two adult children in Minnesota. Each one in the family knows she is a Christian now, which could be life-threatening if she continued to live overseas. Each family member is at a different stage, spiritually, not knowing or trusting Jesus yet. We are in talks with some family members and planning on seeing more.

As you read this newsletter, we are conducting a Bible Study three times a week at a local church. Andrea and her daughter are thirsty to know God's word, and how it applies to their daily activities.

Andrea's story is much longer than the marvel above. We all should know how extraordinarily vital it is for missionaries to be around, fishing for souls to be with Christ in His Kingdom. My family would have never imagined meeting with such a family, who is still suffering from multiple offenses committed by other family members. The Devil constantly attempts to discourage Andrea and her family in many different ways but Christ is Awesome. This ministry is yours. FALL IS ON ITS WAY – PREPARING FALL MINISTRIES DURING COVID-19

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Just a short note for this newsletter! Really! I want to first apologize for not getting all the calling done during our Covid-19 days that are still going on. I am back at it and you should be hearing from me soon so I can hear how you are doing and pray with you for your needs.

Many of you I am seeing at worship or drive up communion and it is great to visit outside after church or for a few minutes after drive-up communion. We continue to open up gradually and have begun some in person Bible studies with social distancing for men and a women's groups at church and in August, we will have a Wednesday evening silent prayer time in the sanctuary with social distancing and wearing masks. Prayer lists will be provided.

As we get started looking at the Fall ministries and the coming 2021 year, I hope you have been in prayer and brainstorming possibilities for ministry. We will begin contacting board chairs to see what ideas you have and what Fall ministries will look like. I will be discussing with confirmation parents of those to be confirmed when we can have larger numbers in our sanctuary with family, aunts and uncles, grandparents, cousins, as well as members for the Confirmation Rite Worship and celebration. Usually, with a large class we have over 100 people. Currently, we are not allowed with the number ratio and social distancing to have that large of group. We also have a few families that have high risk health factors that want to be able to attend if at all possible, so we are in a holding pattern until we can open all the way up for large services. We are so thankful that we moved to first communion and our confirmation class is communing already in the real presence of Christ our Lord. What a blessing. To Him always be the glory!

Last but not least, without being able to hold a voters' meeting the past two quarters and elections, we hope all are alright with waiting until the end of the year, when we hope we can have an in person voters' meeting and elections. The Covid -19 team leaders who meet almost weekly, to work with each week's ministry needs of Holy Cross and feedback from the congregation, will be working and planning for ministry support. The last 5 months of Covid-19, grieving for loved ones (7 people called home of members and family loved ones and funeral services since Thanksgiving) and the turmoil of our society, has hurt so many of our members' hearts and soul. So please lift-up prayers to the Almighty who knows what we need even before we pray or ask.

Thank you for all the cards, prayers and calls to us on the passing of my brother Terry. We appreciate all of our church family's love and support.

The Lord bless you as we pray for a vaccine before years end and then be able to see that the harvest is great. Please pray for more laborers to bring those who do not yet know our Savior and best friend, Jesus!
