LOVING OUR COMMUNITIES TO CHRIST

"When the Holy Spirit has come upon you, you will receive power and will tell people about Me everywhere—in Jerusalem, throughout Judea, in Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." Acts 1:8

Have you ever wondered where the ends of the earth are? In Luke's day as he wrote this second letter to Theophilus the ends of the earth was seen to the north as the isles of Briton where according to legend Joseph of Arimathea traveled with the gospel. Paul desired to go to Spain (Romans 15:24), the end of the earth in the west. The apostle Thomas journeyed east to India and Philip encountered the Ethiopian from the south (Acts 8:26ff). Yet today, the former ends of the earth have come to us. The Twin cities is now home to the largest Hmong community outside of SE Asia and the largest Somalian community in the US. Immigrants from the former USSR countries; the immigrants from African nations of Sudan, Nigeria, Uganda, Ethiopia, Kenya, and Tanzania, not to mention the Philippines, Viet Nam, Cambodia, China, and India from the east and the rising numbers from Mexico, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Ecuador and Panama from the south. The ends of the earth are now our own cities and communities. Yet the one thing that hasn't changed is God's promise that we will receive His power and that we are to tell people everywhere of the love and salvation that is now ours in Jesus.

Our International Friendship Center and relationship with POBLO and our emphasis on reaching our community with the Good News of Jesus Christ just touches the surface of the diverse opportunities God is placing before us to touch peoples' lives with the genuine love of Jesus. What an incredible gift we have been given from God. It is one that God so desires for us to share. Yet before we can share this gift, God has a surprise for you. This gift must first, by God's power become ours in such a way that we are transformed. The disciples waiting in the upper room could never have imagined the transformation that took place in them on that first Pentecost Sunday when the Holy Spirit opened their hearts and minds and mouths to share what God had done through Jesus Christ. This transformation for spiritual growth hasn't changed in 2000 years. There still remains at the heart a deep desire by Christians for community-wide spiritual transformation the following things:

- 1. Brokenness before God and one another for lost people.
- 2. A foundation of prayer, a lifestyle of care and a willingness to share.
- 3. A personal commitment by leaders to model praying, caring and sharing, while mentoring others by sharing personal experiences.
- 4. A time commitment and dedication to real congregational and community transformation.

The local church is God's chosen vehicle for evangelism. For the Church to be the Church, its culture must change through repentance, revival and renewal. As one church leader said whose name escapes me, "Those who have a passion for the spiritual transformation of their community are "true servants of Jesus and are the hearts and hands"

of ministry." Yes, people are transformed when God transforms them. This happens when God works the means He surrounds us with:

An Occasion to Worship where we desire to acknowledge the supreme goodness and holiness of God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit in our individual and corporate worship around Word and Sacrament.

Participation in a Community of Believers who are Seeking God and Finding Fullness of Life in Jesus Christ where we desire to learn more of the Christian faith, experience the transforming power of Christ's love through spiritual disciplines (prayer, Scripture reading, worship, meditation), and discern God's purpose and unique call to each of us to live out whom God has created us to be.

Opportunity to Know the Scriptures Christian people and congregations grow in faith when they are firmly grounded in the knowledge and use of the Scriptures where God in Jesus Christ has shown unconditional love, justice and mercy to us, so we believe in showing unconditional love and mercy in our relationships and common ministry, and will work for justice in the human community.

At Holy Cross, that lesson is beginning to blossom as our eyes are focused outside of ourselves. God is blessing us with the ends of the earth right here in our Christian fellowship. By calling His people together, God is sounding a trumpet call to unity and to action. May we have the ears to hear and the eyes to see that Communities are transformed when people are transformed by God's Spirit, one life at a time.

Seven Ropes that Land People in Your Church

Rope #2 Becoming Familiar with the Environment, Schedule and Beliefs of your church

If your visitor gets disoriented in your parking lot or building, he will want to leave. If he does not understand your schedule of services and classes, he will become too confused to want to stay. If your beliefs are hidden or wishy-washy, he will have little to hold on to. Many churches have an information flier that is given to new people that shows the weekly schedule, a layout map and a brief statement of their beliefs. Make your environment, schedule and beliefs simple and accessible. It helps to settle him into your church.

STEWARDSHIP

June used to be the most popular month for weddings. "She's a June Bride" was a phrase that worked itself into our vocabulary. June may no longer be the most popular month for weddings but weddings do give us an image of how God relates to His people. In Old Testament times God referred to Israel as His bride. He stated clearly that He as her husband would be faithful to all His promises of love, care and protection for His bride.

Marriage was instituted by God as a special relationship in which one man and one woman pledge themselves to love each other in good times and in bad times, in sickness and in health, and forsaking all others, remain faithful to each other so long as they both shall live. God was faithful to His bride, but His bride was unfaithful again and again. God in His love sent "wake up calls" after "wake up calls" to win His bride back. The story of Israel in the Old Testament and, sadly, in the church of today indicates that God's bride is not nearly as faithful as He is.

In the New Testament, especially in the Book of Revelation, the image of Christ and the church is also that of a bridegroom and His bride. Jesus loved the church, His bride, and gave Himself up for her because He wanted to make her holy, cleansing her by the washing with water through the word, and to present her to Himself as a radiant church, without stain or

wrinkle or any other blemish, but holy and blameless (Ephesians 5:25-27 NIV).

As Christian stewards we are members of the body of Christ—His church, His bride. We are empowered by the Holy Spirit to be faithful stewards who seek to honor God and bless others through our wise stewardship of time, talents, treasure and all the other blessings God pours out upon us.

By the way, Father's Day also falls in June. Those of us who are blessed to have godly fathers know what it means to have someone in authority who really loves and cares for us. God, our Heavenly Father, loves us far more than any earthly father could. He demonstrated this by sending His only begotten Son to be our Savior and by showering so many other spiritual and material blessings upon us.

Our response to God's love and lavishness is what we call stewardship. Stewards are those who recognize that God is the Owner of all things and they are simply managers or trustees of that which God has entrusted to them. To make this even more personal think of it in this way: "God's redeemed stewards, in partnership with and encouragement from fellow redeemed stewards, freely and joyfully manage all of life and life's resources for God's purposes."

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

The Gift of Contentment

As children grow up, they often feel cramped by their parents' restrictions. Dad says to be home by 11. But why can't I say out 'til midnight? Mom says to clean your room on Saturday morning. But I want to sleep in late, then roll out of bed, hop in the car and go to my friend's house without delay. I want to do what I decide is best.

The older we get, and especially when we have kids of our own, we begin to see the truth. Mom and Dad were not cramping our style or trying to crush our personal freedom — they were looking out for us, providing for us and teaching us a better way of life.

If that's how it is with fallible human parents, how much more so with our Heavenly Father! We sinners often feel cramped by the Law of God. Our sinful flesh wants to go its own way, do its own thing and be in charge. But in our heart of hearts, we know how foolish this is. We know that God loves us, and therefore all of His commands are for our benefit. Each one of His commandments is meant to bless us. Consider the last two commandments:

You shall not covet your neighbor's house. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not scheme to get our neighbor's inheritance or house, or get it in a way which only appears right, but help and be of service to him in keeping it. (SC II)

You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or his manservant or maidservant, his ox or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbor. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not entice or force away our neighbor's wife, workers, or animals, or turn them against him, but urge them to stay and do their duty. (SC II)

The commandments against coveting are warning us against losing one of the greatest gifts we can possess: contentment. Being content and thankful with what God has provided for us is a necessary building block of living a happy life. Unthankful coveting of what we have not been given will only make us miserable, so God warns us against it.

God has proven His love for us in sending His only begotten Son to shed His blood for us, cleanse us of our sins and brings us back into His family. If He loves us this much, then when percentage of His commandments do you think are meant to harm us? Probably no more than one or two percent, right? Of course that's absurd. God means to bless us with everything He says to us. The Law of God simply describes what a truly happy life, lived in thankfulness to Christ, looks like: It's a generous, merciful, contented life that uses all of the resources God has given us for His purposes.
