When I say the word "church," what comes to mind?

A Brownish red brick building with a cross standing high above a steeple or a large gothic European cathedral? An enormous suburban megachurch or a small, but crowded home-church?

Depending on our cultural context and personal experiences, different images pop in our head when we think about a church, but hopefully we all understand that those buildings are not a church. With such contrasting pictures in our minds, however, how can we tell what truly constitutes a church? That's where ecclesiology comes in.

"Ecclesiology", the theological study of the church, is a big theological term, and rightly so. It must bear a great deal of theological weight. What we believe about ecclesiology shapes the way the church is structured, how the people relate to one another, and how it goes about accomplishing its mission.

Historically, ecclesiology has been an important aspect of Christian theology. Every generation has outlined certain distinguishing marks of a church. The Reformers said it was "the right administration of the sacraments" and "the right preaching of the word." Catholics pointed to, among other things, apostolic succession. For 2,000 years, people have been talking about what makes a church a church—until recently.

Regretfully, the extent of the ecclesiology in most of our churches today is weak. People identify a church simply because it meets and has the word "church" in its name. But beyond that, there is an acute misunderstanding as to how we identify biblical churches.

While many people today understand the church as a building, being a majority doesn't make it right because this is not a biblical understanding of the church. The word "church" comes from the Greek word **ekklesia** which is defined as "an assembly" or "called-out ones." The root meaning of "church" is not that of a building, but of people. It is ironic that when you ask people what church they attend, they usually identify a building. Romans 16:5 says "... greet the church that is in their house." Paul refers to the church in their house—not a church building, but a body of believers.

The church is the body of Christ, of which He is the head. Ephesians 1:22-23 says, "And God placed all things under his feet and appointed him to be head over everything for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills everything in every way." The body of Christ is made up of all believers in Jesus Christ from the day of Pentecost (Acts chapter 2) until Christ's return.

The universal church consists of all those who have a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. "For we were all baptized by one Spirit into one body—whether Jews or Greeks, slave or free—and we were all given the one Spirit to drink" (1 Corinthians 12:13). This verse says that anyone who believes is part of the body of Christ and has received the Spirit of Christ as evidence. The universal church of God is all those who have received salvation through faith in Jesus Christ.

The local church is described in Galatians 1:1-2: "Paul, an apostle ... and all the brothers with me, to the churches in Galatia." Here we see that in the province of Galatia there were many churches—what we call local churches. A Lutheran church, Baptist church, Catholic church, etc., is not the church, as in the universal church—but rather is a local church, a local body of believers. The universal church is comprised of those who belong to Christ and who have trusted Him for salvation. These members of the universal church should seek fellowship and edification in a local church and be reaching out to those in the darkness of the world who needs to hear and experience the love and salvation of God as it is lived out in the church. This is what missional living is all about.

It is living with a commitment to learn how to live a lifestyle of building relationships with people who may not know the love of Christ. This process involves spending time building a community of fellow believers who pray for and encourage one another in establishing relationships with people outside the body of Christ. Living in a missional community requires a significant commitment of time and energy in learning a lifestyle of caring and outreach.

In summary, the church is not a building or a denomination. According to the Bible, the church is the body of Christ—all those who have placed their faith in Jesus Christ for salvation (John 3:16; 1 Corinthians 12:13). Local churches are gatherings of members of the universal church. The local church is where the members of the universal church can fully apply the "body" principles of 1 Corinthians chapter 12: encouraging, teaching, and building one another up in the knowledge and grace of the Lord Jesus Christ.

"The Singing Church"

Lutherans have historically been called "the singing church." There is no doubt that music has been a major component in the theology and practice of the Lutheran church. Luther once remarked about music, "We can mention only one point, namely, that next to the Word of God, music deserves the highest praise."1 Music has a power and purpose that cannot be understated in our worship and the life of the congregation.

But music does more than touch the emotions. Music is a vehicle that carries both the musician and the hearer deeper into connection with the truth of the Scriptures. This is true of the most complex Bach chorale and even the simplest of songs like "Jesus Loves Me, This I Know." Each musical selection within the church shapes the thoughts, minds and faith of the people who experience them.

This is also true of stewardship hymns. We are currently considering the verses of "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (LSB 788) as it shapes our understanding and practice of stewardship. This month we take a deeper dive into verse two:

Teach us to thank you, Lord, for love and grace For life and vision, for a purpose clear, For Christ Your Son, and for each human face that shows Your message ever new and near.

The stanza begins by touching on the truth of the Law. Thankfulness is not a natural posture for fallen humanity. For sinners curved in upon themselves, thankfulness for love and grace is something that must be taught. We are those who hoard and clutch. Our confession of our shallow thankfulness highlights the need for us to learn thankfulness to God.

Thankfulness also points to what we are stewards of: love and grace! All the things we have traditionally called stewardship aren't actual stewardship. Rather, what matters is how we steward the one, true and only treasure: the love and grace of God revealed to us in the Gospel of Jesus Christ. So, all stewardship is stewardship of the Gospel! How can we gaze at the cross and empty tomb and not be thankful?

The LCMS defines stewardship as "the free and joyous activity of God's family — the church — in managing life's resources for His purposes." God's love and mercy give us a clear purpose as we live out our Baptism and practice this joyous stewardship. All we are, all we have entrusted to us, and all we are called to do is to connect others with the love and mercy of God revealed in Jesus!

The faithful steward sings with lips and life of this love and mercy that is ever new and near. In the Scriptures. In the Lord's House. At the Lord's Table. This is where our stewardship song starts and ends. Our family, our coworkers and classmates, and our world need to hear this song!



A Christian Perspective For An Election Year

The year 2012 is crucial for America. Even those who only casually follow politics can identify the high stakes and differing visions that exist for the future of our nation. But what should be the actions and approaches of believers in Jesus Christ during this election season and beyond? After all, aren't we all concerned that God's will be done? I would like us to consider an idea that may get lost in the noise of election-year ads, polls, debates and sound bites.

Certainly, prayer should be an indispensable activity for Christians at such a time as this. Isn't it important to wrestle with the content of our prayers for America to ensure they are Biblical? Are they motivated by the heart of God and His priorities? We do not want the prayer lives of followers of Christ in America to fall in the category of either failing to pray or praying with misquided motives.

Two New Testament prayers give us solid direction not only for what we should pray, but also what to do as a result of the prayer. The first prayer came as a result of local leaders in Jerusalem prohibiting Peter and John from preaching the gospel of Christ. When word reached the church, they responded with a remarkable request in **Acts 4:24b-30**

"Lord, You are God, Who made heaven and earth and the sea, and all that is in them, Who by the mouth of Your servant David have said: Why did the nations rage, And the people plot vain things? The kings of the earth took their stand, And the rulers were gathered together Against the Lord and against His Christ.' Psalm 2:1-2

"For truly against Your holy Servant Jesus, whom You anointed, both Herod and Pontius Pilate, with the Gentiles and the people of Israel, were gathered together to do whatever Your hand and Your purpose determined before to be done. Now, Lord, look on their threats, and grant to Your servants that with all boldness they may speak Your word, by stretching out Your hand to heal, and that signs and wonders may be done through the name of Your holy Servant Jesus."

The ones praying here acknowledge that their leaders and culture are persecuting them, just as they had done with Jesus. But their request is not for policy change or comfortable treatment. Their priority was the gospel and an open door to be able to keep sharing it. No boycotts, no protests. Just child-like faith that believed God would continue to let them freely proclaim the message they had been called to spread.

The second prayer shows that we don't have to speculate on what Paul's goal was when praying for his government. In 1 Timothy 2:1-4 Paul plainly taught what should be the content of our prayers for leaders.

First of all, then, I urge that entreaties and prayers, petitions and thanksgivings, be made on behalf of all men, for kings and all who are in authority, so that we may lead a tranquil and quiet life in all godliness and dignity. This is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior, who desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth.

This isn't just a call to pray for leaders without specificity. The motivation and results are clear. Pray for the salvation of our leaders. Pray for them to grow in knowing God and His will. How will that happen? It must be part of the Church's mission – we need to go to them, not with placards of protest but with spiritual care. Speak the truth of God's Word into their lives in emails, letters on the phone or if possible with face-to-face townhall meetings. Pray for their hearts to be opened to the gospel. For believing lawmakers, encourage them in their walk not to compromise God's principles found in Scripture.

Do we know who our leaders are at all levels of government? How can we pray for them if we do not? In a representative republic, it's great that we can be a part of the process by voting and contacting leaders with our opinions, but how often do our words to them communicate our concern for their eternal destination? Prayers for leaders are required of God's people. But they must be underpinned with a motivation to see God glorified, not just save our land for our children. The goal must not be just a change in laws, but in the hearts of lawmakers.
